BISHOP EDWARD KING

Paul Howitt Cowan was the guest speaker at the Local History Group in February, and spoke about a Controversial Bishop of Lincoln – Edward King, who served in that capacity from 1885 to 1910. Edward King was a high churchman but soon after his appointment Dean Blakesley died. His successor was William John Butler who was also a high churchman. So, from the beginning, Edward King's appointment was unpopular with some Protestants.

Before he took up office, King had been forewarned by a colleague that 1/3 of the clergy in the Diocese were out of their minds, another 1/3 were going out of their minds, and the remaining 1/3 had no minds to go out of! Little did our speaker know when he fed us this snippet that the vote of thanks was going to be given by Rev. Atkinson, a retired clergyman of the Lincoln Diocese, but when that became clear to all, it created quite a lot of amusement.

Bishop King's high church ways actually led to him being hauled before the Archbishop's Court on eight charges; he was cleared of all but two, and declared that he would no longer carry out those particular actions.

It would be wrong, however, to assume that because of this, Bishop King was widely unpopular; in fact, he was very deeply loved by many, and not just among churchgoers. Railway porters, citizens of towns and villages all felt very warmly to him, and Canon Scott Holland wrote that on two occasions he accompanied the Bishop on visits to the Lincoln Fair, and 'it was a delicious

experience to note the affection that followed him about. He draws out love as the sun draws out fragrance from the flowers'.



The statue of Bishop Edward King in the Cathedral is distinct from all the other monuments to Bishops.

It shows a very benign figure, seated and with his hand raised in blessing. My own children always believed that he was waving to them – my daughter still gives him a wave whenever she is in the Cathedral.





It is expected that the principal topics for debate will be Foreign and European Affairs, International Development and Defence.



Local History Group Visit Gainsborough Old Hall



The Local History Group had a very interesting visit to Gainsborough Old Hall on Tuesday 11th May led by Jean Childs.

The Hall is over 500 years old and is one of the best preserved timber framed manor houses in the country. Built by the Burgh family around 1460 it was not just their home but a demonstration of their wealth and importance. By 1596 the Burghs had

fallen on hard times and the house was sold to the Hickman family. Although a number of "home improvements" have been made over the years it remains a "textbook of medieval architecture". Famous visitors included Richard III, Henry VIII, John Wesley and the Pilgrim Fathers.



The tour of the hall was conducted by Paul Howitt-Cowen, a very knowledgeable guide and the visit ended with an excellent lunch at Trent Port.
