Three Tree Fellers

I like trees. These majestic, ancient, living plants maintain our planet, however, like all things they do reach the end of their life. My house has a number of mature trees around it and I wouldn't do without them although I do curse the leaves in autumn and the incessant rain of twigs during high winds. This season I have an ash tree that was diseased by bracket fungus at the base. It had weakened the tree to the point where it was too risky to leave it standing. All my trees have Tree Preservation Orders on them so I needed to get planning consent to have it removed. That done I called in the tree fellers.

This is a top down project because there are houses and bungalows either side of the tree. Not as simple as a few cuts at the base and the whole thing comes crashing down. No, this has to be carefully managed.

The three tree fellers brought in this special hoist to get them up into the crown of the tree.



Getting it close to the tree inevitably led to some damage in the garden. The hoist would only reach so far up the tree and they cut as much as they could from the platform but eventually someone had to go out on a limb.

Although the tree surgeon is attached to the tree by a strong rope it is a very precarious activity especially as he is carrying a chainsaw.

At each stage the cut branches are tied off against the main trunk and slowly lowered to the ground. They may look small from the ground but trust me they are very heavy once they are down on the ground.



After two days of carefully working their way down the tree there was just the last 2 metres to be cut down and pushed over before cutting into slices.

There's enough firewood to last me for several years and the pile of chippings have been used to line the paths around the garden.





Hopefully I won't need to have another tree felled for several years but they're all approaching end of life. When a tree comes down I need to plant a replacement, however getting hold of a good sized tree at this time is proving difficult. Trees are an investment in our future.

12th August - Nigel MacKnight 'Being an Author'


