GARDENING GROUP ANNUAL HOLIDAY 2022

In June the Gardening Club went on a short four day break to the Lake District to look at a range of gardens, carefully chosen by Jane, our Gardening Group convenor, to provide maximum interest and a great deal to talk about.

We started our coach journey early on Friday morning from Tesco in Market Rasen. Everything was loaded quickly and we were soon on our way. Our first garden was on the way to Kendal, and we arrived in time to be welcomed at York Gate near Leeds. The garden is now run by a charity and is regarded as a fine example of a smaller garden, being about one acre. After our walk around the site we were given tea, coffee and cake before travelling to the next garden near Lancaster. As we approached our second destination, I soon realised that I knew the area very well as I'd previously holidayed in the area and had passed the gates of the garden many times but had never visited. I was thrilled to finally get the chance to wander around Gresgarth Gardens designed by Arabella Lennox-Boyd. With a rich tapestry of herbaceous borders and over 7000 trees and shrubs across the valley slopes, this ten acre garden provides a range of vistas and surprises as you explore the site. It was a wonderful setting to take lunch sitting by the lake.



We arrived at our hotel in Kendal in time to explore the town, take a dip in the pool or simply relax before dinner.



On the second day we visited Holehird Gardens near Windermere in the morning. Holehird Gardens is managed entirely by volunteers of the Lakeland Horticultural Society some of whom we met as we wandered the site. Volunteers hold a range of roles and those who choose to garden are given a particular section so that they feel ownership for that habitat or plant species. Housing several national collections, including astilbe, daboecia, mecanopsis, polystichum and hydrangea, this garden was a real gem. This wonderful setting would give many of us some great ideas to try out for ourselves when we returned home. Several of us were particularly intrigued by the fabulous display of small and miniature hostas which were to be found near the Reception Building.

Low Fell West, near Kendal, was our second garden of the day. Bought as a private residence by two keen walkers, this garden is owned and lived in by the current owners. On arrival at the site we were treated to some very special Lakeland weather. Many of us arrived at the house looking rather bedraggled and were keen to get out of the wet. The greatest disappointment was that we all knew our own gardens would be exceedingly dry and we were all secretly envious of the rain that afternoon. After a Lakeland lunch, we were shown around the 2 acre garden by Barbie Handley, the owner. We were astounded to learn that Barbie was also a volunteer at Holehird Gardens and we were truly in awe of her tremendous energy, drive and ambition.

Sunday saw us visit two more gardens. The first was Winton Park, another garden to be found in the National Garden Scheme. This was a larger garden which covered five acres and bordered the banks of the River Eden. The garden contained many fine borders, mature trees and formal ponds. Combining these features had been the ambition of the founding and current owners, who had bought the site as a

derelict property. The house in itself was a tremendous achievement and we were able to enjoy this as it provided the location for our lunch stop that day.



Our next visit was to Oxenholme Road in Kendal. Again in the National Garden Scheme, this much smaller garden of about half an acre proved to be a great favourite of many of the group as it was much more in keeping with many of our own gardens. John and Francis Davenport welcomed us to their home with more tea and cake and an opportunity to wander around. As a keen potter and artist respectively, both John and Francis were keen to demonstrate how gardening combined with their love of ceramics and painting. Several of our group took the opportunity to purchase artwork or ceramics.

We had an early start on Monday as not only did we have to pack, take breakfast and load the coach but there would be a further two gardens to visit before we arrived back in Market Rasen. The first of these visits was to Halecat Nurseries. Abi and Tom Attwood bought this neglected nursery and were able to realise their own dream of owning and running a horticultural. business. The nursery has been overhauled and they've survived the Pandemic. Growing over 750 different varieties, cultivars and species of perennial this place was an absolute gem. What impressed me a great deal was that they had managed to plan how they raised their own young family alongside running the business, and they had survived the last few years. They are truly a remarkable couple as indeed are so many of the owners of each site that we visited over our Lakeland break. As a specialist herbaceous perennial nursery, the types of plants grown here would be in keeping with the style of gardening that now dominates more current trends in both sustainability, maintenance and interest. Halecat Nursery provided many of us with a wonderful opportunity to "blow the holiday" budget and, being the last day, any plants that were bought wouldn't have to reside for too long in the depths of the luggage compartment of the coach.





Our final garden stop was at Yewbarrow House. This garden was another stunning example of what can be achieved when you have a dream. According to Country Life it's "more Cornwall than Cumbria." The garden contains many rare and exotic species that are tender or require a kinder climate than the Lakeland Fells. Perched on the coast the garden has stunning views of Morecambe Bay and the range of light was truly fabulous. The garden contained an Orangery, a sunken garden and a Japanese garden complete with infinity pool.

It's a tough ask to choose a favourite garden as each one has many special features and there are things to admire and thoughts to take away from each location. Many of our group particularly enjoyed the smaller gardens as these would be in keeping with our own home gardens. For me however I'll be brave and select the garden at Yewbarrow. Full of symbolism, follies and homages to the grand scale this garden was structured to make a platform for viewing the fabulous coastal vista before it.



Our holiday was over all too quickly. The four days were packed with a great deal of interest and enjoyment. It gave the group time to meet members of our group that we didn't really know. We shared our experiences together with members of Louth U3A who joined the trip. We got to know people a little better. We all had a wonderful time. In particular this is down to Jane, who organised the trip, ably assisted by our wonderful coach driver Michael, who was always available and willing to help.

WALKING GROUP NATURE WALKS

Recently Nature Walks have been introduced into the programme of the walking group and led by Mary Orphanoudakis and Jean Potterton. These last about two hours and are only a couple of miles long giving plenty of time to look at the wildlife.

On Wed 26th June eight members of the walking group met at Linwood Warren, a Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust Reserve, opposite the Golf Club in Market Rasen for our nature walk. We walked across the dry heather path finding some cross leaved heath in flower, sorrel, lesser stitchwort, heath bedstraw, eyebright and tormentil. The heather isn't in flower until August but we also found new patches of heather beginning to grow. Continuing on, the path led to the wildflower meadow. This field was cultivated farmland only a few years ago. There were a lot of seedheads and a few remaining flowers of yellow rattle. This is sown to weaken the grasses so that they don't compete with the wild flowers.

There was a great variety of grasses with betony, milk thistle, birds foot trefoil, tufted vetch and a lot of knapweed in bud.



We were surprised to find so many butterflies because of the recent rain. These included meadow browns, ringlets and the small skipper along with grasshoppers, six spotted burnet and hoverflies. Honeysuckle, lily of the valley, deer fern and some very tall bracken were found in the woodland walk together with a penny bun fungus. A very well camouflaged partridge surprised as it took off only a few feet from us as we were examining a plant.



On our way back to the gate over the heathland a red kite was flying. What a treat.. Come and join us on our nature walks. We hope to include more of these walks in future.

<u>U3A GARDEN GROUP EXCURSION TO</u> <u>RENISHAW HALL, DERBYS.</u> <u>ON THURSDAY, 29TH SEPTEMBER, 2022.</u>



We have arranged an excursion for both the Garden Group and the History Group members as there is lots of interest for both groups, although it is open to all West Wolds members. We have booked a guided tour of the Hall for the whole group. Most people enjoy visiting gardens too and this is a very grand garden with lots of clipped hedges and garden rooms as well as some parkland areas for those who would like to walk and explore. Situated just ten miles outside Sheffield City Centre, Renishaw Hall and Gardens have been owned by the Sitwell family since 1625. It is still a very muchloved family home, but has a long and interesting history. As typical of many country houses it grew in the 17th century, had later Georgian additions, and some uncertain years in the 1900's when many country estates were being sold, but Renishaw was saved by Sir Reresby (7th Bt) and Lady Sitwell in 1965. It is now the home of their daughter Alexandra Hayward and her family.



The stunning Italianate gardens were laid out in the late 19th Century by Sir George Sitwell 4th Baronet. He was the brilliantly eccentric great-grandfather of the current owner Alexandra Sitwell.

The Stables Courtyard is home to the Café and Rex Whistler function room at Renishaw, along with a Farm Shop selling local produce and small selection of retail shops.

There is a Museum within the Stables, exhibiting memorabilia and history from the family, which includes a 20-minute video on the Sitwells.

You can take a packed lunch and eat in the gardens or visit the Café where you can purchase lunch. The charge which includes coach travel, driver's tip, entrance to the garden and guided tour of the Hall is £35.




