### THIS MONTH IN THE GARDEN

August – what can I say? For most of the month I could not get a fork into the ground and then it rained hard but I got Covid and had no energy! Let's move on to September and energy nearly restored.



Some colour is appearing in my garden again, asters, rubekias, dahlias, roses giving a second show (See picture), penstemens and salvias.

Now is the perfect time to mulch in the garden. All those leaves you saved last Autumn should now be making good compost, or you may have been shredding small woody twigs, both can be added to the soil now to improve it ready for next year but also to give some added protection from the winter frosts.

Did you dig up any of your bulbs after they had

flowered? I had forgotten about them but found them in my shed and ready for removing the dead foliage and preparing ready for planting again. Some bulbs such as early daffodils and crocuses can now be planted.

With the heavy rain we have had, the weeds are popping up everywhere. I am trying to stay on top of it. My driveway has them springing up everywhere between the pavers so a bit of a challenge, as I find the only real way to tackle this is to get down on my hands and knees.

Finally, it is a great time to dig up some self-seeders and put them somewhere else where there is a bare patch, or better still pot them up and bring them to the Garden Group for others to enjoy.

He holds a Plant Heritage National Collection of hardy Euphorbia which has been featured on B.B.C. television (twice) and in numerous gardening magazines including the R.H.S. journal The Garden, and Gardens Illustrated. Don is a nurseryman, running a small nursery specialising in hardy perennials and a large range of Euphorbias, and an author, having written books and articles about Euphorbias. For over 20 years Don has lectured extensively to a variety of groups all over the country.
