WHAT'S COMING?

Wednesday, 5th June. A garden visit to Wragby Road, Sudbrooke. 2 p.m.



This garden has not been opened before so a new one to explore for our group. It is imperative that you book with me before attending when I will give you all the directions. This is what Coral says of her garden:

"I moved here in 1998 and the garden was in two halves, a tennis court, a long line of pear trees that blocked the view down the garden and a very large veg plot with a grass cross path.

After a year we decided it needed a bit of an update and work commenced with the gravel garden, greenhouse and patio. Next we tamed the shrubbery on the right and planted a holly rondel to screen the garden from the house at the bottom. They all came home in the boot of my car and looked like sticks in the ground when first planted! The planting has been a little trial and error and I have learned a lot over the years.

The ground is a silty soil and not that deep. I thought it would be dry but turns out that parts of the garden live up to the nickname "Soggy Sudbrooke". Lots of home compost has gradually improved it. We raised the bottom of the garden with 220 tons of soil as it dipped down and was a bit boggy. We added the log cabin and after a bargain railings find on eBay, we built raised beds for a veg garden and added another greenhouse.

The woodland walk happened by accident after my dog kept cutting through the bushes to get to the bottom. I thought I would make a wider path through and then got carried away. The cobbled paths were all put down by me. I sold my motorbike and bought a gas works yard from Preston. Three articulated lorries later and my husband said "what have you done woman?" It took me 8 years to lay them all. All the statues are from eBay. I like things to look at....so the garden has lots of areas with bits and bobs from eBay; including the newly renovated bird table.

Whenever I found something on eBay, my hubbie's first words were always "where is it?" I made the Auricula theatres for £30 after finding they were silly money to buy during lockdown. I already had the tiles in my building supply leftovers. In 2021 I planted the rose garden in memory of my husband who died of MND in 2020. There are 45 David Austin roses that are coming along nicely and smell lovely when the weather is right.

All gardens are ever changing and my most recent change is in front of the white greenhouse where I dug up a large miscanthus grass. I could not face struggling with it every few years, so I replaced it with some topiary and pots and the area is now called the chimpottery. My other hobby is carving. You will see my house sign by the front hedge and other carvings on the veg plot railings and around the garden. I look forward to seeing you in June. I am good rain or shine as I have 3 verandahs you can shelter under.



17th June. Afternoon tea at Jane's.

Pre-booking essential. Please bring a plate of nibbles and we will have a lovely spread. 2 p.m.

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4th July. A visit to Ludney House Farm, Louth. 2 p.m.

The Louth mini-group of Lincs Hardy Plant Society have invited us to join them on a special private opening starting at 2 p.m. £7 to include tea and cakes.

This is a beautiful, large garden lovingly developed over the last twenty years with several areas of formal and informal planting including a pond which attracts a wonderful variety of wildlife. There is an excellent mix of trees, shrubs, perennials, a rose garden and flower areas. There are plenty of seats positioned around to sit



and enjoy a cuppa and piece of cake. There is wheelchair access to most of the garden.

Make your own way there but it is essential that you let Jane know you are visiting so the owner knows how many to accommodate. If you can offer a lift or you want a lift please contact Jane.

30th July. A coach visit to Yeo Tree Farm, Gosberton, Near Boston.

£35 to include coach, garden entrance, tea and cake and the driver's tip. Leave at 11 a.m. Return 4 p.m.



This is a lovely country garden of 1½ acres. There are large herbaceous and mixed borders surrounding the well-kept lawns. There is a wildlife pond with two bog gardens, a woodland garden and shaded borders containing many unusual plants. A mulberry tree forms the centre piece of one also lawn. There is picturesque annual flower meadow, wild flower meadow and large vegetable plot.

A 3 night/4 day HOLIDAY from 18th July, 2025 to Shropshire



The holiday is booked for three nights staying in the Telford Hotel and Golf Club (see above) with views over the Ironbridge & Gorge. The hotel has a spa and health club which we can enjoy while in the hotel. We will be visiting gardens on 4 days, and at least 6 of them!

I have booked to visit the area in the next few weeks for the usual pre-holiday reccy. I have been in touch with a friend who is part of the Hardy Plant Society in Shropshire who has given me a list of private gardens owned by their members who would be prepared to host a garden visit. I will also be visiting David Austin Roses, Wollerton Old Hall Gardens and a couple of nurseries, to assess whether they are worth a visit and if so carry out a risk assessment and negotiate terms with the owners.

It is still difficult to give you a price as until the gardens have been selected and entry fees agreed as well as sorting out lunches I won't know but I believe it will be around £550/£575 all in, i.e. hotel on a dinner, bed and breakfast basis for 3 nights, entrances to all gardens + some with refreshments, 3 lunches, coach and driver's tip. I have an allocation of single rooms but for one of these there is a supplement of £100 so if you can share a twin or double room that would keep the price down.

I do anticipate a lot of interest in this holiday so please give me an expression of your interest early so you won't be disappointed.

I will give you more information as soon as I have it to hand.




Coach excursion on 30th May to Littlethorpe Manor, Near Ripon, Yorkshire

Eddie, the head gardener and his wife Michelle took us on a very interesting guided tour around the garden explaining what the owners had planned many years ago which he was tasked to create. Eddie clearly had great vision, time and above all, the budget required to make the owners dreams come true. This included a great deal of lighting for evening entertaining and Eddie enjoyed showing us how he could control these, the fountains and water features and of course

We began our tour of the 11 acre estate in the walled garden designed to follow the seasons so there is always something of interest and its centrepiece of the metal gazebo with a symbolic tree of life. Attending an event: It is crucial that you make an early booking for any **coach excursion or holiday** because we have to make a decision on the financial viability of the excursion. If the event is not well enough supported it will have to be cancelled and your money refunded. Once we have paid your money over to pay for the coach and garden entrance we will be unable to make a refund. This is usually within two weeks of our departure, unless you can resell your place.

For all *other activities*, except our monthly meetings you do still need to make a booking as we have to confirm numbers with the garden owner or the workshop facilitator.
