WHAT'S COMING

19th February. Speaker Andrew Ward. "Gardening in a changing climate".

Early last year some of our group visited Andrew's nursery at Norwell and purchased a number of lovely plants. He has been our guest speaker in the past and been well received.

Andrew lectures widely throughout the country undertaking approximately 50 talks a year. He trained as a Plant Breeder and started Norwell Nurseries and Gardens 29 years ago with his wife Helen. The garden holds over 2,500 different varieties of plants and has featured in many magazines including Country Living, Country Life, English Gardener, Landscaper Magazine, Gardens Illustrated, and the RHS Garden magazine. It has been been included since 2013 in the highly prestigious publication Great Gardens to Visit. It is renowned for colour from spring but especially in the autumn when the National Collection of Hardy Chrysanthemums can be seen. They also hold the National Collection of Astrantias.



If there is one thing that climate change will bring, it is extremes of weather, either drought or Therefore, plants that exhibit a willingness to survive and even thrive under tricky conditions will become increasingly important. However, that doesn't mean we have to rely on boring Hypericums and Geranium Johnson's Blue!

This talk looks at the consequences of global warming and at beautiful, interesting, more unusual plants that are amenable to weather extremes. New in 2019

Meeting – November 25 Celebrity gardener Mark Lane.



Many of you will be familiar with the TV gardener Mark Lane. He is our guest speaker next November. Mark says

"No matter what level of ability you have there is a gardening task that you can undertake. Being the UK's first garden designer and BBC gardening presenter who uses a wheelchair full-time, I really want to show how gardening can help both physically and mentally. For me, I suffered with depression for many years and still have the 'spectre of depression' sitting on my shoulder, but by being outside, getting my hands into the soil, which releases endorphins in the brain and serotine, I start to improve my mental health. Rubbing soil within the palm of your hand and between the fingers can help

with manual dexterity. By thinking about what to sow or grow, planning pots for autumn or the spring, or creating a new border you stimulate the neurons in your brain.

Garden tools have come a long way, and there are some great ergonomic ones and tools specially designed for individuals who live with weak wrists or are unable to clutch a tool. I would always recommend trying out tools before you buy. Make sure they feel good when you use them, are lightweight and well-made.

There are two types of gardener – an active gardener who continually gardens and loves sowing, planting, planning and creating; the other is a passive gardener who enjoys sitting back and enjoying a garden and the feeling that the space creates, the scents, colours and the wellbeing benefits of being outdoors. It doesn't matter which type you are, whether you garden alone or garden as a social activity the knack is finding a gardening task that you can do. Pace yourself and at regular intervals just sit in your garden, whether it be a patio, a balcony, a few window boxes or a rolling estate and enjoy nature at its best.

Absolutely nothing! And just when we really do need something in the diary. Unfortunately, our January meeting had to be cancelled because our venue, The New Life Church is undergoing renovations which ended up being a bigger and longer job than originally thought. I am sure we will all benefit from the new works.

Attending an event: It is crucial that you make an early booking for any **coach excursion or holiday** because we have to make a decision on the financial viability of the excursion. If the event is not well enough supported it will have to be cancelled and your money refunded. Once we have paid your money over to pay for the coach and garden entrance we will be unable to make a refund. This is usually within two weeks of our departure, unless you can resell your place. For all **other activities**, except our monthly meetings you do still need to make a booking as we have to confirm numbers with the garden owner or the workshop facilitator.
